**II. Shasta Housing Collaborative and Ready to Rent Program**

**Introducing the Shasta Housing Collaborative – Presenter: Jenny Melchor**

The Shasta Housing Collaborative is a community-driven group that brings together housing professionals, service providers, and community partners to strengthen our local response to homelessness and housing instability.

Through this collaboration, members:

- Share Resources – Exchange tools, services, and up-to-date housing opportunities
- Address Barriers – Identify challenges within the system and develop practical, solution-focused approaches
- Advocate for Change – Elevate frontline and lived experience voices to inform policy and improve systems
- Collaborate & Build Community – Foster strong cross-agency relationships to better support those we serve

The collaborative also supports emerging initiatives such as coordinated resource sharing, housing navigation tools, prevention efforts, and community-informed advocacy.

**Ready to Rent Program – Presenter: Jenny Melchor and Veronica Cutchen**

Ready to Rent is a six-week housing readiness program designed to support individuals transitioning from homelessness into permanent housing. Through hands-on learning, participants complete real housing steps—such as applications, budgeting, and barrier resolution—while building the knowledge and community connections needed to not only obtain housing, but sustain it long-term.

**III. Development of Youth Action Board (1:35 pm to 1:40 pm)**

Technical Assistance advisors from TAC have been working with the NorCal CoC YAB Work Group to support the development of a Youth Action Board (YAB) to better engage youth and address youth homelessness. Formation of a YAB would also enable the CoC to be eligible for HUD funding.



A draft concept has been developed to adopt a YAB that would operate similar to the CoC County Advisories and function regionally as opposed to one large YAB.

Our next steps include discussing options for determining the focus for each YAB, establishing proposed two year budgets for each YAB and determine the potential funding sources.

### **I. Action Item – Review and Approve Meeting Minutes Attachment A February 19, 2026 Executive Board Meeting Minutes**

Grace Poor motioned to approve. Second by Robert Szopa. All in favor. None opposed. Motion passed.

## **4. Discussion**

### **I. Compliance with HHAP 6 Application Requirement to Address Encampments and Adoption of Encampment Policies**

The NorCal CoC HHAP 6 Application was filed August 28, 2025. NorCal CoC counties each identified known encampments and included specific plans to address the encampments

Siskiyou County filed a policy that is only missing one component; Lassen County provided a partially compliant policy. Del Norte, Modoc, Plumas, Shasta and Sierra indicated “Formal Encampment Policy – Nonexistent”

Answers provided to the following three Application criteria

1. Describe existing efforts to address encampments: Modoc, Plumas and Sierra stated they do not have any encampments, Del Norte, Lassen, Shasta and Siskiyou described efforts to address encampments
2. Does the Eligible Applicant actively commit to adopting a policy that complies with Cal ICH Guidance: each county answered “yes”
3. Provide a specific timeline for future adoption of formal policies that comply with Cal ICH Guidance: Del Norte identified May 2027 Modoc, Plumas, Shasta and Sierra identified May 2028

HCD requested a March 9, 2026 HCD zoom conference to discuss a path forward for the NorCal CoC to comply with HHAP 6 Encampment Policy adoption. On March 9, HCD indicated that the timeline identified in the HHAP 6 Application did not meet the HCD timeline criteria and HCD requested that the timeline for adopting a formal Encampment Policy occur in the next 4-6 months. HCD provided the HHAP 6 Application FAQ Question #14 and response that includes the Cal ICH Guidance: Addressing Encampments. Additionally the FAQ includes seven required components. HCD indicated that the requested Cal ICH compliant policy does not require Board of Supervisor approval.

## **Draft Encampment Policy. Exhibit C**

Shasta County Health and Human Services Agency has shared the attached Draft Encampment Policy.

1. Please review the draft policy and determine for each County what is needed to prepare and adopt an Encampment Policy.
2. Discussion to include a proposed timeline and next steps needed to adopt an Encampment Policy for each County.
3. T.E.A.C.H., Inc. will work with the NorCal CoC to assist with coordination of the approval of Encampment Policies to be filed with HCD in compliance with HHAP 6 Application requirements.

The meeting focused on addressing HCD's requirements for an encampment policy to approve the HHAP-6 application. Kristen explained that HCD identified missing components in the submitted application, particularly regarding encampment policies across the seven counties. The group discussed a draft policy developed by Shasta County and identified the need to add specific details about notice requirements for encampment residents, as per CalICH's 7-point guidance. Key questions were raised about the approval process at the county level and whether the policy would apply to both CoC and county-specific applications. The group agreed to share the draft policy among CoC Advisory Boards for review and to seek HCD's pre-approval of the draft before final adoption by each county.

## **II. HMIS Data Status (Pathways MISI and T.E.A.C.H., Inc.)**

- d. HMIS Agency Participation Agreements were distributed beginning the week of December 8 by Jamie Northrup at T.E.A.C.H., Inc. to be signed by Agency Executive Directors and returned to T.E.A.C.H., Inc.

Daniel reported that the LSA submission from January had clean data with only minor warnings, and the California SPMs report submitted a few weeks ago also had no errors. The team is currently working on the housing inventory and point-in-time count report due at the end of April.

Teddie reported monitoring and inactivating user licenses for those who haven't logged into HMIS in 90 days, and mentioned preparing a trend analysis of system performance measures to present at the next executive board meeting. The discussion focused on coordinated entry implementation across counties, with Teddie noting that many people need to be exited from the system and that data discrepancies exist between different reporting systems, particularly for Plumas and Sierra counties. Grace mentioned that Lassen County had been following a policy of keeping people in coordinated entry for up to a year with interim updates, and the team discussed the need to approve the coordinated entry policy in April and address data cleanup issues to meet state performance outcomes requirements.

Kristen explained that the NorCal CoC received the second half of HHAP-4 funding after taking corrective action to clean up data in HDIS and identifying how to address technical and reporting issues. She noted that for HHAP-5, they are meeting the minimum requirement of showing progress in three SPMs out of seven, and they are waiting for verification to determine eligibility for the second half of HHAP-5 funding. Teddie mentioned that HMIS data uploads can affect past performance measures, potentially changing outcomes for earlier HHAPs. Kristen emphasized the importance of data quality for future funding eligibility and highlighted the ongoing efforts to improve data entry practices and obtain reports to monitor progress.

The team discussed updates to HMIS training dates for April, which Daniel will update and share in the system. Maddelyn suggested sending calendar invites to HMIS users about upcoming trainings, which Kristen agreed to follow up on with Jamie's help. Teddie mentioned the availability of the self-



sufficiency matrix tool in HMIS for interested agencies.

Jamie reported that most agencies have submitted their HMIS Agency Participation Agreements, with only six remaining.

Daniel outlined the timeline for updating housing inventory information in HMIS and HDX, with a goal to complete updates by March 31st and submit to HUD by April 30th. Kristen announced plans to send out an inquiry to gather feedback on lessons learned from the PIT and HIC processes for 2027 improvements.

### II. Revised Governance Charter – T.E.A.C.H., Inc. – Update

The meeting covered updates on the revised governance charter, which was approved by Siskiyou and Shasta Advisory with an addendum in draft form.

Updates were shared on budget development for the next fiscal year, with a focus on aligning budgets with a fiscal year ending June 30th.

#### **VI. Development of Youth Action Board - T.E.A.C.H., Inc. - Update**

The NorCal CoC has the opportunity to receive Technical Assistance to support partnering with youth with lived experience of homelessness and the development of a Youth Action Board (YAB). We had our first meeting on February 11, 2026 and our second meeting was February 24, 2026 with Jenna Espinosa and Manuela Molina Pineda with Technical Assistance Collaborative (TAC).

Representatives from Shasta, Modoc, Lassen and Siskiyou joined the meeting. Outreach will be made by TAC to engage with the other three counties.

TAC is offering to provide youth-specific technical assistance and support to the NorCal CoC through a contract TAC currently has with HCD to support HHAP grantees with their Youth Set Aside spending and other youth homeless system activities.

Development of a YAB and implementation of a coordinated community approach to preventing and ending youth homelessness will enable the NorCal CoC to apply for future HUD Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program funding.

The next meeting will be scheduled during the week of March 16 or 23. Please email Kristen Schreder if you would like to be included in future meetings.

The group discussed progress on developing a Youth Action Board, with the next meeting scheduled for March 24th.
